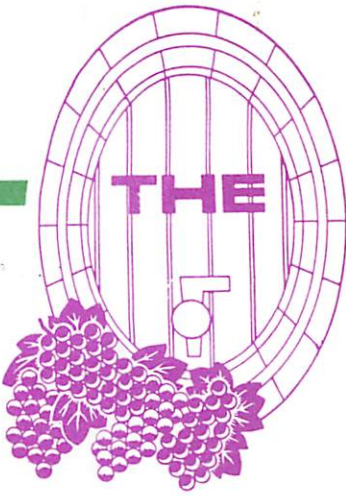

### LAST WEEK

Normally we try not to bore you with a rehashing of happenings at the previous week's meeting; however, last week's meeting at Mike Starr's South Valley YMCA deserves a few comments.

As most of us know, our Club has contributed at least \$4,000 over the past four years to help the facility in construction and other start-up costs. Now that we have had our looksee and felt the warmth of Mike and his staff, we feel we can say, in all sincerity, that our money has been well spent. Thanks for inviting us, Mike.

Another source of satisfaction was the excellent program put on by one of the two Boy Scout Troops which we sponsor - Troop 294. The Troop's Scoutmaster, Andy Cosby, and a staff of 5 Assistant Scoutmasters, are dedicated men doing a tremendous job for their 5 patrols comprised of 39 scouts.

The program opened with a slide presentation, narrated by Scout Jim Rose and Asst. Scoutmaster, Rod Loehr. The slides depicted the outdoor activities of the troop including hiking, camping, canoeing, cooking, etc. - all adventuresome fun, as well as learning experiences.

Eagle Scout, Doug Rodenberger, then gave a dissertation on his Eagle Scout project that consisted of clearing a five foot wide trail, heavily laden with poison oak in Quicksilver Park. The project consumed approx. 250 man hours of labor.

The final third portion of the program consisted of an excellent talk by Scoutmaster Andy Cosby on the purpose and objectives of Scouting, and how Troop 294 is responding to them. Andy attributed the

Troop's unusual success to the dedication of his 5 Asst. Scoutmasters, excellent parental support, good attendance at troop meetings, programs to satisfy the interests of different age groups, a competitive and disciplined spirit among the boys, an open-door policy where no boy wanting to join is refused, and last but not least, financial help from the big boys in the Almaden Valley Rotary Club.

We left the Y with a good feeling, bolstered perhaps, by the sight of a little green tent (one of five we bought for the troop) and a huge long strip sign, plastered with multi-colored small handprints and loudly shouting in various sized crimson letters; "Thanks for helping us build our YMCA!"

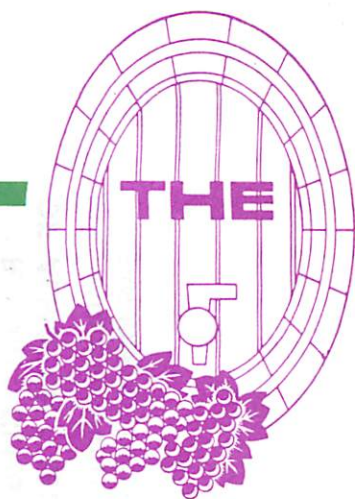
### PANCAKE BREAKFAST

## ROTARY INFORMATION

The basic procedure by which a man is proposed for and elected to membership in a Rotary Club is:

\*The prospective member's name is submitted to the Board of Directors by using proposal

card in triplicate.

\*The Board, upon satisfactory report by the club's classification and membership committees, approves the proposal and the proposer is notified through the club secretary. (NOTE: Until this approval is granted, the prospect should not be informed that his name has been proposed for membership.)

\*Proposer and members of Rotary Information Committee inform the prospective member of privileges and responsibilities of Rotary Club membership, ask him to complete an application card, and secure his permission to publish his name and proposed classification to the club membership.

\*Prospect's name is presented to club. If no objections are received by the Board within ten days following the publication of the prospect's name, he is, upon payment of his admission fee, considered to be elected to membership and his name is reported to the general secretary of Rotary International.
